9 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Reverend
10 Martinez, and thank you for being with us today. I'm
11 going to now ask Council Member Carmen De La Rosa to
12 spread the invocation on the record.

13 COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Thank you so much, Mr.
14 Majority Leader. A few words on Dr. Rev. Louisa
15 Martinez, who hails from my district, who was born in
16 Sánchez Samaná, Dominican Republic in 1946. Since her
17 early years under the guidance of her mother, she,
18 she began participating in community organizing and
19 church ministry at the Iglesia Evangélica Dominicana,
20 where she became a youth leader in her spare time and
21 taught literacy skills in after school for her
22 community.

23 With her ministerial work, Doctor Reverend Louisa
24 Martinez participated in numerous grassroots
25 organizations with the Latino community, civic and

professional organizations with the United Methodist Conference. Reverend Martinez is a member of the Human Rights Association of the Dominican Republic.

She has been a source of light and blessing for my community, for myself personally. And after her retirement, Reverend Martinez continues to participate in community organizing and advocacy fundraising and mentoring new, young pastors and, and young people in my community, uh, on 100, on 228th, the Marble Hill section of my District.

We are honored to have Doctor Reverend Louisa Martinez as our invitational speaker today. Mister Majority Leader, Madame Speaker, uh, we thank Doctor Reverend Louisa Martinez for being here and I make a motion for unanimous consent to spread the invocation in full upon the record.

24 SPEAKER ADAMS: Thank you, Majority Leader. Good

25 afternoon, everyone. As a reminder, masks are

strongly encouraged to be worn throughout the Stated Meeting and Council Chambers. We are currently experiencing a sixth COVID wave, and infection rates in New York City have surpassed 15% City-wide with some neighborhoods seeing positivity rates above 20%. Please take the necessary precautions. Get tested often. And if you have not done so already, please get vaccinated and boosted so you're protected from the worst impacts of COVID.

Since the last time we met, the United States Supreme Court has made several rulings that have made us less safe, stripped away rights that we have counted on for decades, and cast our future in doubt. The Supreme Court's decisions on guns, abortion rights, environmental protection, and a range of civil rights have taken our country backwards at a time when we can least afford it.

Our nation has been tormented by the scourge of gun violence, yet the Court decided to strike down New York's century-old gun law, putting all of us at greater risk. From Highland Park, Illinois, Uvalde, Texas, to neighborhoods across our City, we are continuing to experience violence that inflicts harm and trauma on our communities. We must come together

as a City and as a country, to bring an end to the dangerous proliferation of guns, provide care and healing to help victims of violence recover, and invest in the health and wellbeing of our neighbors.

On the federal level, Congress finally passed bipartisan gun safety measures that will ultimately save lives. While much more is needed to curb this crisis, it is a step in the right direction after the lack of un-realization of any progress for years.

Our state partners, led by Governor Hochul, Senate Majority Leader Stewart-Cousin, and Assembly Speaker Heastie, made New York a national leader by enacting gun safety laws in their special session after the Supreme Court decision. These laws will protect New Yorkers, especially the expansion of sensitive areas that restrict guns in locations that this Council identified as in need of protection. We will continue to be strong partners in this work because we cannot allow gun violence to continue to hurt our City.

During the special session, New York also made clear to the entire country that we are a safe haven for civil rights, abortion access, and reproductive healthcare at a time when we are all under attack.

The State Legislature advanced the first step to add an equality amendment to the state constitution and in short time, this amendment will come before voters to enshrine equal rights and protect our right to safe and accessible reproductive care.

Today, we will take action by voting on the New York City Abortion Rights Act, an unprecedented legislative package to safeguard and expand abortion and reproductive healthcare across our five Boroughs. Those who live here, and those who come to New York City will have access to care and will be protected, because in our City, we firmly believe that safe access to reproductive healthcare is a human right. And the prioritization of these issues is what it looks like when women are a majority in the legislature, more accurately reflecting our city.

We are proud of the incredible work of our Members and staff who have shown national leadership and we'll dive deeper into the respective bills of this package later in the agenda.

Since the start of the year, 10 people have died at Rikers Island while under the watch of the Department of Correction. It is deeply troubling and, quite frankly, horrifying. Most recently, we lost

Elijah Muhammed, who was kept in isolation for more than 30 hours, and it reportedly took several hours before any staff member discovered his death.

The violence and dysfunction on Rikers represent an abject failure of our City. When people within a City system are repeatedly dying, it is a reflection that something is deeply wrong. We are witnessing a humanitarian crisis, and we cannot accept this as normal. Conditions must change, and this Body is going to have to take significant action to contribute towards ending this current state.

Let us take a moment to remember the 10 people whom we've lost this year due to violence and neglect on Rikers: Tarz Youngblood, George Pagan, Herman Diaz, Dashawn Carter, Mary Yehudah, Emmanuel Sullivan, Anibal Carrasquillo, Albert Drye, Antonio Bradley, and Elijah Muhammad.

July is Disability Pride Month. It's a time when we celebrate the accomplishments and contributions of New Yorkers with disabilities, commemorative historic laws that promote inclusivity and accessibility for all, while renewing our commitment to strengthen and

expand those policies. Let's continue to uplift New Yorkers with disabilities this month and beyond.

Last weekend, more than one million Muslim New Yorkers celebrated Eid, Eid al-Adha, the Festival of Sacrifice and Community. Eid is not only a time to reflect on the importance of values like compassion and justice, but to also partake in charitable actions by distributing food to those who need it most. On behalf of the New York City Council, I wish everyone who celebrated, a happy and joyous Eid.

Before we move on, I want to announce that a Member of our City Council Staff will be departing later this month. Emily Rooney, an Assistant Deputy Director in the Council's Oversight and Investigations Division, started in 2015. She started as an intern for former Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez. She then joined the Legislative Division as a Legislative Policy Analyst for the Committees on Transportation and Aging. Emily went on to become a Senior Legislative Policy Analyst before her current role.

Emily is a hardworking, intelligent, and thoughtful colleague who has worked on significant issues during her time with the council. Emily, we

wish you all the luck and all the best at New York Law School and your legal career.

And while we will certainly miss Emily, I am so excited to announce that the Council has welcomed two new members of our staff, Aaron Mendelsohn, Director of our Oversight and Investigations Division, and Perris Straughter, Director of the Land Use Division. Welcome to the Council, and I'm excited to work with you.

And finally, please join me in congratulating Council Member Kevin Riley and his family on the arrival of their beautiful baby boy. We welcome baby Caleb with you, Council Member. We are so excited to welcome him to our extended Council family. Bless his heart.

Now, we have a very big, sated agenda today, so let's get to it. Today we're voting on several legislative land use rules and finance items. We will be voting on the following land use items: 34 Morningside Avenue, ANCP Cluster, will facilitate the renovation of a cluster of partially occupied, City-owned residential buildings and their conversion from rentals to coops owned by the tenants in Council Member Richardson Jordan's District.

41 Summit Street rezoning will facilitate the construction of a four-story residential building, with four housing units in Council Member Hanif's District.

77-39 Vleigh Place rezoning will facilitate the development of a new five-story mixed use building, as modified by the Council. It will include approximately 75 housing units, ground floor retail space, and on-site parking. The Council is modifying to reduce the density in order to better conform with the existing character of the neighborhood while still creating approximately 23 permanently affordable housing units under the MIH program in Council Member Gennaro's District.

11th Street and 34th Avenue rezoning will facilitate the construction of two eight-story mixed use buildings, with an estimated 382 apartments, including 100 units affordable under MIH, local retail, arts, and light industrial space in the Ravenswood, Ravenswood area of Astoria, Queens. The Council is modifying the MIH text amendment to strike option two in Council Member Won's District.

Wetherole Street and 67th Avenue rezoning will facilitate the development of a new eight-story

residential building. It will include approximately 21 housing units, five affordable units, as well as eight bicycle and 11 car parking spaces. The Council is modifying the MIH text amendment to strike option two in Council Member Schulman's District.

Resilient Edgemere, a package of zoning changes, Urban Renewal Plan amendments and disposition approvals to facilitate the implementation of HPD's quote, "Resilient Edgemere Community Plan." End quote. In summary, the Plan will reduce development in the area of the neighborhood with the greatest flood risk by downsizing and advancing a community land trust to manage low density housing and open space while facilitating the development of five HPD sponsored mixed use buildings with affordable housing, commercial spaces, and community facilities along the subway line. The Council is modifying the application to remove a largely privately owned block from the rezoning area and reduce density in Majority Whip Brooks-Powers' District.

Lastly, two applications in Council Member Dinowitz's District. 4541 Furman Avenue will facilitate the redevelopment of a new mixed use residential, commercial, and community facility

building. It would include approximately 150 affordable housing units and 52 parking spaces on the sub cellar level. The Council will modify to eliminate the proposed expansion of the transit zone. The site selection of a 696 seat primary school in Community District Eight.

We will also be voting on the following finance items. Preconsidered Resolution 255 sponsored by Finance Chair Justin Brannan, to approve the new designation and changes in the designation of certain organizations to receive funding in the expense budget.

In addition, we will vote on several appointments. The Council will provide advice and consent for the following: Juan Camilo Osorio, for appointment as a member of the New York City Planning Commission, David Gold for appointment as a member of the New York City Planning Commission, Rasmia Kirmani-Frye for appointment as a member of the New York City Planning Commission, and Christine Yoon for appointment as a member to the Board of Standards and Appeals.

The Council also will vote to confirm the following: Nicole Yearwood for appointment to the

Equal Employment Practices Commission and Ngozi Okaro for appointment to the, to the Equal Employment Practices Commission.

Lastly, we will be voting on the following legislation: Introduction 480-A, sponsored by the Council's Parks and Recreation Committee Chair, Council Member Shekar Krishnan, would co-name 78 thoroughfares and public spaces throughout the City based on requests of Council Members whose Districts include the location. A complete list of the co-namings can be found on the Council's legislative database. We thank you to our staff, Chris Sitorri (SP?), Patrick Mulvihill, and Chima Obichere.

Next, we're voting on Introduction 212-A, sponsored by our General Welfare Committee Chair Deputy Speaker Diana Ayala, which would require a monthly report on emergency housing usage. This bill would also require that report to be updated to include information on the total number of all individuals utilizing emergency housing in the City and the total number of families with children, adult families, single men, and single women, utilizing temporary emergency housing.

Additionally, Introduction 212-A would require the Mayor's Office of Operations to report on the exits from various City-admitted facilities including the Department of Youth and Community Development, Department of Homeless Services, Department of Housing Preservation and Development, and Human Resources Administration Facilities.

Finally, the bill would require the Mayor's Office of Operations to report on the financings, starts, and completions, of permanent housing for those existing City-administered facilities. In addition, this bill would make related technical amendments. We thank you to our staff Imenta (SP?) Killawon (SP?).

Next, we will vote on a package of legislation intending to increase the City's involvement in utility related issues and pressure Con Edison to take action to prevent a similar crisis from occurring in the future. Time and time again, new Yorkers experience dramatic and unexpected increases in their Con Ed bills propelling a public outcry and investigations in rate hikes.

The City Council is taking action of our own to address this matter. I'm very proud of the bill I

sponsored, Introduction 372-A, which would create an Office of the Utility Advocate in the City for the very first time. This Office would be charged with receiving feedback from City customers on their energy utility providers, advocating for utility customers at public hearings, assisting utility customers with accessing financial help to pay their utility bills, and educating City utility customers on their rights and methods to lower their bills.

We also have several Resolutions in this package. Resolution 162, sponsored by Council Member Linda Lee, calls on the New York State Legislature to pass amendments to prevent to prevent a utilities rate case from exceeding a certain percentage each year. Beyond the Public Service Commission rejecting a rate case proposal, there are no mechanisms to prevent a utility from proposing an exorbitantly high rate case.

Resolution 172, sponsored by Council Member Rafael Salamanca, calls on, on New York state to increase the number of Commissioners on the Public Service Commission and permit New York City to appoint two of the Commissioners. The Public Service Commission approves the rate increases for utilities

and ensures New Yorkers receive adequate service. While Con Ed holds a near monopoly over the electricity market, the City does not have the power to appoint any Commissioners to the PSC. By granting the City power to appoint Commissioners, the City would gain greater oversight over the PSC and utilities would become more accountable to the City.

Resolution 173-A, sponsored by Council Member Sandra Ong, calls on the Governor and the New York State Legislature to expand financial relief programs to assist City residents struggling to pay their utility bills. Outstanding utility debt could impair the City residents' credit and the City's economic recovery from the pandemic. Further state funding should be allocated to assist New Yorkers unable to pay their utility costs.

Resolution 174-A, sponsored by Council member Marjorie Velázquez, calls on Con Ed to improve communication with City residents about increases in utility costs. Many City residents were shocked to find the dramatic rise in their utility bills in January 2022. Con Ed must improve communication to ensure all residents are aware of impending price increases. We thank you to staff Noah Meixler.

And finally, the Council will vote on a monumental reproductive rights package. In the wake of the United State Supreme Court's dangerous decision to overturn Roe v Wade in Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization, this Council is taking action to safeguard abortion and advance reproductive healthcare in New York City. The right to safe and legal abortion is a fundamental human right and must be protected for all who seek reproductive healthcare, especially in the aftermath of the Supreme Court's dangerous decision.

This package of Council legislation will help ensure the necessary protections and expanded resources to meet New Yorkers' reproductive health needs and those of all who come to our City in need of access to care. Leaders of this Council's historic women majority are taking significant steps to protect the rights of women, trans, and gender non-conforming individuals, and this leadership is critical to expanding and protecting those rights that we rightfully deserve.

The first of the, the first two bills in this packs are sponsored by the Council's Women and Gender Equity Committee Chair, Council Member Tiffany Cabán.

First, is Introduction 465-A, which would require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to annually report on the number of births and the number of abortions providing in the City each year for both the individuals who are residents of New York City at the time of such birth or abortion, and for those who are not residents.

DOHMH would also be required to assess the ability of licensed medical providers in the City to provide reproductive healthcare, identify any challenges faced by license medical providers to provide reproductive healthcare, and make recommendations for increasing the capacity of such providers to provide reproductive healthcare. We thank you, staff, Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

Introduction 466-A, also sponsored by Public Advocate Jumaane Williams and Council Member Shahana Hanif, would prohibit City agencies from using City resources including, but not limited to, time spent by employees and the use of City property to detain persons for performing or aiding with abortions or to cooperate or provide information to out of state entities related to abortions performed in New York

State. We thank you to our staff, Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

Now, we will also vote on two bills co-sponsored by Council Member Shahana Hanif, Introduction 475-A, which is also co-prime sponsored by Council Members Cabán, Farah Louis, Carlina Rivera, Crystal Hudson, and Amanda Farias, and Public Advocate Jumaane Williams. This Introduction would create a private right of action for interference with reproductive or endocrine medical care. A person would be able to bring a legal claim of interference with medical care when a lawsuit is commenced against them on the basis of their accessing medical care related to the human reproductive or endocrine systems that is legal in New York City and which was provided in whole or in part in New York City. Thank you to staff members, once again, Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

Introduction 474-A, also sponsored by Council Member Hanif, and co-prime sponsored by Council Members Williams, Hudson, and Cabán, and Public Advocate Williams, would require the City to engage in a public education program about safe access to reproductive healthcare. Specifically, the bill would

require the City to post information about the City's Access to Reproductive Healthcare Facilities Law that protects areas surrounding these facilities and protections for people making reproductive health decisions under the City's Human Rights Law.

The bill would also require the City to include information on accessing resources, to find comprehensive reproductive healthcare, and privacy protections, and would require a media campaign on reproductive healthcare as well.

We are also voting on two bills sponsored by Council Member Carlina Rivera. Introduction 506-A would require the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection to implement a public outreach and education campaign on facilities that deceptively advertise or are misleading in their offerings of reproductive health services. This would provide information on what services these facilities provide and do not provide, how they advertise their services, how these facilities can impact timely and safe access to pregnancy care, and how a person can file a complaint about their deceptive practices.

Introduction 507-A, sponsored by Council Member Rivera, and co-prime sponsored by Council Members

Gutiérrez and Joseph, would require DOHMH to provide FDA approved medication for medication abortion at no cost to a patient at health clinics operated by DOHMH. DOHMH would provide such medication to patients who seek to terminate their pregnancy when the use of such medication is indicated and in accordance with a medically reasonable and good faith professional judgement of such patient's medical provider.

DOHMH would also provide counseling and timely referrals to other health facilities and qualified family planning providers if needed for other services. Thank you once again to Brenda McKinney, Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez.

Also included in this package are several Resolutions. Resolution 195, sponsored by Council Member Gail Brewer and co-prime sponsored by Council Member Julie Menin, calls upon the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign the Reproductive Freedom and Equity Program which would establish a grant program to provide funding to New York abortion providers and non-profit organizations to increase access to abortion care. Thank you staff

members Brenda, Brenda McKinney, and Anastasia Zimina.

Resolution 196-A sponsored by Majority Whip Selvena Brooks-Powers, calls upon the New York State Legislature to pass and the Governor to sign Senate Bill 9137, Assembly Bill 10356, which would allow out of state physicians to provide reproductive healthcare services in this state while awaiting full licensure. Thank you once again, staff Brenda McKinney and Anastasia Zimina.

Resolution 197, sponsored by Council Member Cabán and co-prime sponsored by Council Members Velásquez and Hudson, and Public Advocate Williams, declares New York City as a safe city for all those in need of abortion related care. Regardless of your background, everyone is welcome here in New York City to get the proper care they need. Thank you again, Brenda McKinney and Anastasia.

Resolution 200, sponsored by Council Member Julie Menin, recognizes the importance of the Roe v Wade by declaring January 22, 2023, as Roe v Wade Day in New York City. January 22, 2023, will mark the 50th anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision. While Roe v Wade may be overturned, it will forever

be commemorated here in our City. Thank you once again, Brenda McKinney and Anastasia Zimina.

Resolution 242-A, sponsored by Council Member Menin, would support Assembly Bill 10468, Senate Bill 8797B, which seeks to amend Article One of the New York State Constitution in relation to equality of rights and protection against discrimination. The amendment would add an equal rights provision that would expand the list of protected classes to include ethnicity, national origin, disability, or sex, including pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes, sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression. This proposal was recently approved by the Legislature and now requires another approval next legislative session in order to be placed before the voters of New York State to amend the State Constitution.

Resolution 245, sponsored by Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, calls upon the United States Senate to Pass and President Joe Biden to sign the Women's Health Protection Act to reinstate and protect the federal right to abortion through its codification into federal law. Thank you once again, Brenda McKinney, and Sara Liss, and Andrea Vazquez. Also,

thank you to Jayasri Ganapathy, William Nori (SP?),
Noah Meixler.

This is an incredible package of bills that
reflects the leadership of so many of our members,
whose efforts are to be applauded during such an
important moment in our country's history. I thank
you for your attention. Now, I will turn it back into
the hands of our Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. That was a
long one. Lot, lot of items today, a lot of good
items on there. Thank you, Speaker Adams. We're going
to now move in to discussion of General Orders. We
are going to begin with Council Member Brewer
followed by Council Member Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I'm,
uh, just here because we have a Resolution that I
think is part of the Speaker's and the Council's
amazing, uh, package. This particular Resolution
supports funding in Albany for, uh, those who are
coming to the City of New York from other states who
will be desires of abortion services. I think it's
the number 195.

And the reason I mention it is, if you see the
papers today just as an example, there's a 10-year-

old who lives in Ohio and was raped and had to go to another state. And unfortunately, this is happening over and over again. So, that particular bill, uh, that we are resolving to support, um, I think was asking for \$50 million. It won't pass necessarily in, um, this, uh, session, but hopefully the next one.

And I just, as the Speaker has indicated, um, also the State however, I want to thank the Governor, has put in \$35 million into a fund to both, in the first round help those organizations that are providing abortion, and then in the second round do even more independent clinics and provide security, because unfortunately that's needed. So, we're part of a very big process, um, but New York is certainly leading. I just want to thank all of us, the entire City Council, for their support. Thank you very much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, and just, uh, we're going to do any talk on, if you're talking about a Resolution, just when we get to the Resolutions. So, we have a list for that as well. So, if you are signed up, it's okay. If you're signed up to speak, uh, on a Resolution, we'll add you to that list when we get to that point. Uh, we're going to go

now to Council Member Barron and then we'll hear from Council Member Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Uh, thank you. My colleagues, I rise to highlight two great men in my District whose names will be adorning our street signs. Now, one is Mister Jose Rosado and the other is Mister Melvin Faulkner. Jose Rosado was a member of Community Board Five. He helped so many families. He helped so many individuals whether it's employment, whether it's housing issues, but his pet project was the Latin Souls Little League. Not only did he turn them into athletic winners, but he also turned them into men and young women who knew how to now navigate the community that they lived in as they grew older. So, we honor Mister Jose Rosado.

And then, Mister Melvin Faulkner who worked in my office for many, many years. This man was incredible. He helped over 100 families out of foreclosure. He went down and before lawyers got a hearing from the judges, they heard from Mister Melvin Faulkner. His seniors, he made sure their housing was taken care of. He made sure that all of the seniors got the food that they needed. And Melvin Faulkner, he never stopped working. I couldn't even get him to stop

working. "Take a break, Melvin," but may you rest in peace now and take that well deserved break that you needed when you were here on earth. So, to those two, I just wanted to rise and honor them as we put their names on street signs.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you Council Member Barron. We're now going to hear from Council Member Rivera, followed by Council Member Joseph.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Okay. New York has always been a leader in protecting reproductive, health, and rights and I want to thank Speaker Adams and my colleagues in the Women's Caucus for putting forward such a comprehensive and important package of bills that will both protect our existing rights and improve access to abortion care in this post-Roe era. The bills that we're passing today should act as a model for cities throughout the rest of the country for what we can and must do to protect our basic right to bodily autonomy and increased access to important healthcare.

I am particularly proud of my bills, Intro 506, that I introduced with the Bronx Borough President Vanessa Gibson to implement an outreach and education program to inform New Yorkers about the deceptive

advertisements and misleading information provided by facilities that say that they provide reproductive health services, but they're actually fake. They're anti-abortion centers that prey on patients in what will be one of the most vulnerable times in their life.

And Intro 507 required DOHMH to provide FDA approved medication for medication abortion at no cost to a patient at health clinics that they operate. And I want to thank Council members Gutiérrez and, and Joseph. This legislation will ensure that the people most impacted by abortion bans across the country will be able to access reliable healthcare should they come to New York City seeking abortion care.

Again, I want to thank Speaker Adams for your leadership, my colleagues in the Women's Caucus, Bronx Borough President Vanessa Gibson, and the Advocates. There are so many, NIRH, Planned Parenthood of Greater New York, the Latina Institute, and everyone who has rallied, protested, called your elected representative and spoken out about this injustice from the Supreme Court and for making sure that New York remains committed to protecting the

reproductive rights of everyone who needs access to care. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now going to go to Council Member Joseph, followed by Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER JOSEPH: Thank you, Majority Leader. I'd like to speak today in honor of Sarita Rein who was called home to God on July 25, 2020. Sarita was a lifelong educator and today she is being honored with a vote for a street renaming, in my, in the district of my colleague, Council Member Inna Vernikov.

Born on October 19, 1935, Sarita came to Brooklyn, New York from Lima, Peru for a visit. But she decided to stay in New York when she met her husband, Arnold. They had two children, Greg, who works at the Department of Education, and my friend, Bridget, who works at the UFT.

Sarita was a gold standard for her dedication to young people. She began her career with the Department of Education as a parent coordinator where she was promoted to assist Bill Thompson, who at the time was the School Board and Vice President. Among her many accomplishments, she was elected President

of the District 21 School Board, as well as President of the New York Association for Brain Injured Children. She served as the Committee on Special Education Chairperson for Community School District 12 in the Bronx, and she later moved to Community School District Two in Manhattan as a Deputy Superintendent.

Sarita taught aspiring educators about the fundamentals of special education at the College of Staten Island and was the initial planning team for the creation of Edward R Murrow High School. Last, last, but certainly not least, she was the parent, the PTA Association President until 1985.

A street co-naming is a tremendous honor. Sarita, I am sure you are listening to us from up above and I thank you for your years of service to our young, to, to the City's young people. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now going to go to Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you and good afternoon. Um, I, too, would like to celebrate the passage of a strong reproductive rights package today, including my own bill, Resolution 196-A, calling on the state to pass legislation that will

allow out of state physicians to provide reproductive health services in New York while they await full licensure.

New York has long been a sanctuary for women seeking abortion and other reproductive care services, and we will continue to be. We cannot delay in the fight to protect, protect abortion access and bodily autonomy for people across this country.

I'd also like to congratulate Nicole Yearwood for her nomination to the Equal Employment Practices Commission. As a fellow soror of Delta, Sigma, Theta Sorority, Incorporated, and from her years of advocacy on behalf of marginalized communities to bolster voter engagement and strengthen our democracy. I know Nicole will do good work on the Commission and the fight for a fair workplace.

I'd also like to acknowledge a street co-naming bill we are passing, which includes two new co-namings in Rosedale recognizing the lives and contributions of W. O'Brien and Oswald Grannum. I was honored to work with the Rosedale community to honor both of these Rosedale residents and their years of community service.

And finally, I'd like to speak on the Resilient Edgemere Land Use item. Today's vote is in support of resiliency and a path to home ownership for black and brown families, but there is much more work left to be done. This project, in its original form, was one of how many land use proposals we've seen have placed a burden on marginalized communities with no clear path to critical investments that would sustain such a project and help the community thrive.

Although we have secured many commitments, there is more work left to be done. But there are many positive components of this project. Through the community advisory board, we will continue to shape this project in a way that benefits Rockaway. We reduced the proposed density by half on the peninsula and, and also was able to secure a 35% floor for home ownership, financial resources to remove barriers to affordability, and down zoning to promote resiliency and protect our coastal community.

We are investing in our roads to eradicate chronic flooding and congestion, as well keeping the City's foot to the fire when it comes to investments in schools in our community, as our, um, need will grow with the development. We are modernizing our

evacuation plan to match the new footprint of our community and prepare for stronger storms.

I would like to thank Chief of Staff Jeremy John, First Deputy Chief of Staff Faiza Ali, the Land Use staff, for their, their extremely hard work on this as well as my own Alex, um, Hunter, my Policy Director, tying up the commitments made by the administration overnight and well into today.

My community sent me here to fight for them and bring home the best project. And that's what we've done. And with that, I encourage my colleagues in the Body to vote in support of this. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're now going to go to Council Member Farias followed by Council Member Williams.

COUNCIL MEMBER FARIAS: Thank you, Majority Leader. Um, I want to shout out the Women's Caucus legislative package being introduced today which focuses on accessibility, agency, and safety for women, trans, and gender-expansive people to have real access to abortion care.

There are five bills from the package being voted on today, which includes Reso 195, Intro 465-A, 466-A, 475-A, and 507-A. All of these bills create a

number of proactive protections so that New York City can maintain abortion access for all people with the capacity for pregnancy.

I know that abortion may not directly affect everyone, every one of us in this room, but in a country with a high maternal mortality and a lack of childcare infrastructure, it is important and our duty as legislators to protect the lives of women, trans, and gender-expansive people which makes signing protective bills like these that much more critical. I urge all of my colleagues today to vote yes on every bill in the package.

I also have another bill, Intro 179-A, which would require the Mayor's Office on Workforce Development to report on the role of women and gender-expansive workers in nontraditional careers. Data like this is how we first assess what is and is not working in our agencies. There has never been a more critical time than now to focus on getting women in the workforce as we continue to recover from the pandemic. Women deserve the high paying, stable, union jobs that construction and other nontraditional careers offer. By passing this bill today, we are prioritizing women and gender-expansive peoples'

economic wellness and making sure every sector in our workforce has the best people in the job for it.

With my last 25 seconds, I'd also like to acknowledge the street co-naming of Marie Reed Way in my District. Marie Reed gave all of herself to the Soundview community. She was a dedicated member of Soundview Presbyterian Church and I'm really proud today to be introducing a street co-naming, um, for our community back in Council District 18. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll hear from Council Member Williams, followed by Council Member Hanif.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you. I am very proud to co-prime 474-A, uh, sponsored by Council Member Hanif, uh. As, um, you know, we think about the pivotal moment in the fight for equal access to reproductive healthcare, the overturning of Roe v Wade should not discourage us, but instead ignite us to act. And that is exactly what we are doing today.

Um, I am excited about the amendments to the bill and really want to thank the bill sponsor for her flexibility in making sure that, um, we strengthen our efforts, um, and include additional City agencies to make sure we maximize our impact.

I am equally excited to be voting on the appointments, uh, for the Equal Employment Practices Commission. This Commission has, uh, had some vacancies for quite some time, so I know they are excited to welcome, uh, two new members, Ms. Yearwood and Ms. Okaro. And I just want to thank the Speaker and Council Leadership for prioritizing both of these very important measures. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And, uh, we'll hear from Council member Hanif followed by Council Member Narcisse.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you, first, to Council Member, um, Williams. Um, I want to thank Chair Williams and Cabán for championing, uh, my bills, Intro 474-A and Intro 475-A. Um, I also want to thank Public Advocate Williams, Council Members Hudson, Louis, Rivera, Farias for introducing these bills alongside me. And of course, gratitude to Speaker Adams for facilitating today's important package of reproductive rights legislation before us.

I want to thank the, the folks behind the scenes who made these bills possible, including Council Staff Jayasri Ganapathy, Rachel Cordero, David Seitzer, Brenda McKinney, and Andrea Vazquez, as well

as my Legislative and Budget Director Alex Liao,
Chief of Staff Nora Brickner, and of course, NYCLU
for their invaluable insight.

New York City's abortions protections are
underutilized, with many New Yorkers simply not aware
they exist, and 474-A addresses this information gap
by requiring the City to conduct language-accessible
public education and media campaigns about existing
protections. These include the right to access the
health facilities without harassment and prohibitions
against employment or housing discrimination on the
basis of reproductive health decision.

Additionally, following the Dobbs decision, there
will be an influx of people travelling to New York
City for reproductive care. People seeking trans-
affirming hormone treatment will also travel here for
care as well. These folks are vulnerable to civil
suits for receiving medical procedures that are legal
in our city, but illegal in their home state or
municipality. And so, 475-A addresses this issue by
establishing these suits as interference with medical
care and allowing people to countersue under New York
City law. If the countersuit prevails, the plaintiff
will be awarded \$10,000 in damages and also awarded

costs of litigation. These bills in the legislative package before us cement our City as a true bastion for reproductive rights.

I also want to note that I am voting aye on the 41 Summit Place rezoning in my District. At the outset, I was super hesitant to support this application because I believe there's greater need for manufacturing districts than the continued development of market-rate housing. After several rounds of negotiations and community input, we were able to secure a fourth of the building for new, uh, for affordable housing at 60% AMI and a commitment of \$20,000 in improvements for the community garden. I sent out an email, and I appreciate the ways in which my colleagues have responded. So, thank you so much.

And also, big day for my District. We, we are co-naming.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you, Council Member.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Kensington as Little Bangladesh.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Very Good. Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member, I believe last

but not least, we'll now hear from Council Member Narcisse.

COUNCIL MEMBER NARCISSE: Um, for the street co-naming, first and foremost, I have to say thank you to, um, Council Member Darlene Mealy for introducing the co-naming of East 56th Street and Lindon Boulevard to Kade Ashton Tyler Lewin Way in honor of my constituent.

Kade Lewin was an innocent, intelligent, fun, loving, 12-year-old, who lack was, I mean, life was cut short due to another act of senseless gun violence in our street, streets. It is my hope that this mem, this memorial in the form of the street co-naming serve as a reminder to all of us that we must work together to bring an end to gun violence in our community. It is time for us to walk the walk, not just talk, but to address the inequities all over New York City. And, once again, thank you.

And I am proud that New York City is standing up for female reproductive rights and it will serve us as, um, this will serve the City as a safe haven for those residents of states who have been denied the right to choose. We women should be able to have a right over our body. We must do all we can to protect

the right and the safe of abortion, not only for New Yorkers, but for all Americans who arrive in our state seeking to make their choice about their bodies. So, thank you. I hope all my colleagues will vote and I believe in 31 women strong. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We have two more. We're going to hear from Council Member Avilés followed by Council Member Richardson Jordan.

COUNCIL MEMBER AVILÉS: Great. I guess, um, first, I'd like to extend my congratulations to Council Member Riley and his growing family. And, Speaker, I think it may be time to talk in earnest about a daycare center here in the Chambers or in the building somewhere close.

Um, there's a great deal of work to be proud of today, especially the reproductive health package that we will be voting on earlier. I'm also delighted to vote on a host of street co-namings that honor New York City's everyday heroes. Look at this long list of incredible people. It should remind us about the collective power and responsibility and how incredible New Yorkers do acts of kindness and love every single day.

Of course, I have to pay special tribute to someone from my District being honored by a street co-naming as well. Sandra Vizcaino was a long time Sunset Park resident and community activist who emigrated to Sunset Park in 19, in 1977 from the Dominican Republic. She was a mom, a wife, a sister, a friend, a neighbor, and educator. And she was the, also the first educator in New York City to die from COVID-19.

To Sandra and her family, gracias. The District, District 38 community thanks you for your service to our youth and families and for being such a dedicated New Yorker. And please pay attention. We are not out of this pandemic. And in her honor, please take extra precautions to protect yourself and your families. Thank you, Sandra.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member Richardson Jordon.

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDSON JORDAN: Hi. Thank you. I, um, wanted to call people's attention to LU 45 which is on, uh, today's Stated. It's a housing project in my District. Um, this was, this was a long one, but we did reach resolution and I really want to thank some Members of Land Use, uh, particularly

Chelsea Kelly, Andrew Lassiter, and Perris Straughter. Um, I also would like to thank Jay Coe (SP?) from the Speaker's Office, uh, and, uh, my very own Ovi (SP?) Latimore (SP?), um, Legislative Director, uh, for District Nine, um, because we got there.

Uh, this, this is really an ode to our residents' self-determination. Uh, this was a, a cluster of buildings where some residents were ready to take an ANCP deal, but other residents, understandably so, rightfully so, wanted to remain in TIL, and fight for the original TIL promise. Um, and, and I'm just glad that we were able to work out something that worked for the residents and their own empowered decision-making in, in a difficult process.

Um, I would also very much like to thank Council Woman Stevens, Council Woman De La Rosa, Council Man Kagan, and Council Man Barron for signing on to a letter, uh, that I had put out around the budget for, uh, support for the TILs and this is not something that's going away. Uh, because while we are taking a step forward with some residents, we have other residents who still need support. So, we, as a

Council, must fund TIL. So, I wanted to thank those Council Members as well, uh, for their advocacy.

Um, also, Council Man Marte and Council Woman Nurse, uh, for showing interest and, and having further discussions. And Chair Louis, uh, for being open to a possible hearing around the TILs, uh, and continuing further discussion. So, uh, but overall great work and, um, and we'll also continue the fight. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Right on time. Uh, thanks everyone. We are now, uh, going to close General Orders and we're going to move into the report of Special Committees.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. Um, today's a big day and I, I think we have a lot to be proud of. Um, even before the far-right wing used a mix of perjury and dirty tricks to hijack and pack its majority with far-right wing fundamentalist ideologues, the Supreme Court already had all the makings of an illegitimate anti-democratic institution.

And we've been fed this fallacy that the judiciary is some apolitical institution. Not ironically, its exactly because I was a practicing attorney who litigated our constitutional rights in court every day, that I know that courts and judges that preside over them, are just as, as inherently political as the other two branches of government.

And it's with that knowledge that we can then say enough. So, enough deference to this collection of religious fundamentalists and corporate extremists, enough talk about how the Court serves as a check on the legislative and executive branches. It's time to start talking about how those branches can, should,

and must check the Court. And the extremist majority's indefensible decision to overturn Roe v Wade is a searing affront to human rights, a precursor to immense death and suffering and a call for us all to get organized.

And we've said this many times before, it's going to take an immense ground swell of action to get what we really need, the guaranteed right to a safe, legal abortion on demand, without apology, and at no dollar cost for anyone who determines that they need one.

Um, and what we can do today is ensure that New York is a safe city for anyone receiving, performing, or assisting in abortion care.

So, I'm really proud that many of my colleagues have risen to this occasion and crafted a wide array of legislation to counteract this attack on all people who, who can get pregnant. And so, it's with that in mind that I emphatically vote aye on all of the abortion related, um, legislation and, uh, aye on everything else. And abstaining on, uh, Res 264.

COUNCIL MEMBER CARR: I'd like to disclose on the record that in this Transparency Resolution we're

funding CUNY and my domestic partner is a student at CUNY. And with that said, I'll be voting no on Introductions 466-A, 474-A, 475-A, 506-A, and 507-A, and aye on the rest.

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER DE LA ROSA: I want to thank our colleagues and our Speaker who has led on this historic, uh, access to reproductive and abortion services package and the Women's Caucus as well. New York is notoriously considered a beacon for all those who are pushed to the margins of our society. As other states begin and continue to heavily restrict access to abortion and abortion care, these proposals are essential in preparing New York's bandwidth for the expected influx of people seeking reproductive healthcare from outside of state.

We must aptly prepare to ensure that not only, uh, people from outside of state, but also people right here living in New York who do not have access to healthcare are provided with imperative care that they need, um, and, and services that they're looking

for. These services are never truly available until we remove the barriers that prohibit or limit people from seeking medical assistance.

This means that we must provide ample funding, access to information, expanded services, language access, language access, and expediting the process to receive potentially lifesaving medical attention and prescriptions to ensure that we are delivering equal and equitable reproductive and abortion services in New York City. So, I want to thank the colleagues for this historic package.

I also want to take a moment to acknowledge the co-naming of Ramona Elizabeth Rodriguez Way, who was a woman who unfortunately, was killed by her husband in an act of domestic violence in my District. Her sisters, her daughters, who are watching us right now, have started an organization, Long Live our Butterfly, to provide direct access to domestic violence and intimate partner violence survivors in our District. And so, I wanted to take a moment to acknowledge the scourge of intimate partner violence that continues to take over our City and thank them for turning their pain into action on behalf of Ramona Elizabeth Rodriguez.

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2 I vote aye on all.

3 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Dinowitz?

4 COUNCIL MEMBER DINOWITZ: Aye on all.

5 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Farias?

6 COUNCIL MEMBER FARIAS: I vote aye on all. And I
7 just quickly want to say that abortion access is
8 healthcare and the healthcare access that people
9 individually need does not directly impact each of
10 here personally, and as legislators representing
11 numerous people in our communities, we need to make
12 sure that we are legislating for everyone.

13 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Feliz?

14 COUNCIL MEMBER FELIZ: Aye on all.

veterinarian originally from Peru, who brought his expertise and dedication to Jackson Heights for over 40 years, while expanding his veterinary and community service to previously underserved communities. Doctor Sergio Rubio was truly a humanitarian who treated all, um, in the community as a veterinarian, uh, in need, and all whose, um, pets, uh, uh, desired, needed services, too. Uh, and it is a great honor to, to sponsor this co-naming today.

The other co-naming would be for a section in my District that would be renamed as Little Thailand Way to commemorate the vibrant and growing Thai community in Woodside, Elmhurst, and Jackson Heights. The Thai community has grown very rapidly and Woodside Avenue, where this co-naming would be, uh, would be a, uh, reflection of the vibrancy and the beautiful culture of our Thai community. And thank you.

And with that, I vote aye on all.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEE: Aye on all and very proud especially today to be part of the first women-led majority Council.

LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Marte?

11 hero, uh, police officer Shawn Powell at the
12 intersection of Sumner and Lewis. Uh, you know, two,
13 uh, icons of our community that, uh, you know, put in
14 service to the City.

16 receiving co-namings, um, as well as finally a street
17 co-naming for Bishop Marvin D. Williams, the Senior,
18 of, on the intersection of Myrtle and Tompkins, uh,
19 another significant community figure in Bed-Stuy. Uh,
20 so, happy to see a co-naming for, for that family as
21 well.

22 Um, and I am aye on all. Thank you.

17 Education and my oldest daughter is going to the

19 And I vote aye on all.

21 COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: I want to disclose for the
22 record that my mother is an employee of the New York
23 City Police Department, and they are included in this
24 Transparency Resolution.

25 And I vote aye.

LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Sanchez?

COUNCIL MEMBER SANCHEZ: Aye on all.

LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Schulman?

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Permission to explain my vote?

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Go ahead.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: I want to acknowledge two street co-namings that I am sponsoring in my District, Joseph Hennessy Way. Joseph Hennessy was a long time Chair of Community Board Six in Queens for over 30 years and very active in the community. And Greg Stein who was an LGBTQ activist and active with the AIDS Center of Queens County and many other organizations.

And I also want to, um, say that on LU 83, Resolution 281, and LU 84, Resolution 282, those are, that's a project in my District that I am very happy to say, I was able to get deeply affordable housing for. It's a small, it's a small development, but it's another development in my, in my District that I'm able to, um, have more families be able to, to come and, and live in the community.

Uh, and I also want to thank, um, the Speaker for her leadership on the historic access to reproductive

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2 rights and healthcare, um, in this package led by
3 this historic body of women. Uh, thank you and I vote
4 aye on all.

7 abstaining on 480. Thank you.

9 COUNCIL MEMBER BORELLI: Aye on all except 466-A,
10 474-A, 475-A, 506-A, 507-A. Thank you.

11 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Thank you. Powers?

13 disclosing that we're funding Mount Sinai in this and
14 my mother works for Mount Sinai.

15 LEGISLATIVE CLERK: Speaker Adams?

16 SPEAKER ADAMS: I'd just like to, uh, acknowledge
17 once again, uh, my extreme pride in this Body. Um,
18 first time ever women majority in the New York City
19 Council looking out for the reproductive rights and
20 the healthcare of women, not just in New York City,
21 but across this great country of ours.

22 I'd also like to acknowledge a street co-naming
23 in my District 28, which I call the Great 28, will
24 have a street naming after Ritawantee, also known as
25 Auntie Rita, Persaud Way. Auntie Rita was hit by, uh,

a hit and run driver a couple of years ago in my District, in Richmond Hill. And I want to uplift her in her memory today.

And I'd also like to uplift two bastions of southeast Queens. I believe that the Saint Albans area, uh, David and Renee Bluford. They will also be commemorated in a street co-naming. They were bastions in community service and pride for those of us who grew up under their leadership in southeast Queens.

With that, I happily vote aye on all.

And M 77 and Resolution 266, adopted by a vote of 46 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative, and 2 abstentions.

I just am going to hold for one second for a clarification on a vote. Hold on one second.

Okay. Uh, sorry, just one addition. Land Use 70 and Resolution 275, adopted by a vote of 46 in the affirmative, 1 in the negative, and 1 abstention.

Okay. That's it. Thanks. We will now move into the Introduction and reading of bills.

SPEAKER ADAMS: All bills have been referred to Committees as indicated on today's agenda.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now move to discussion of Resolutions. We'll first hear from Council Member Ung.

COUNCIL MEMBER UNG: Good afternoon and thank you for opportunity to speak about Resolution number 173-A. This Resolution calls on New York state to expand financial relief programs to help struggling

residents who are falling behind on their utility bills due to a nearly threefold increase in the cost of energy at the start of the year. Utility customers here in New York City both unaware of impending price increase and coping with a colder than usual January were surprised by their bills that incurred dramatic, unexpected increases. Many were already suffering economically due to the pandemic and had to make the difficult decision between covering their housing, food, and medical costs or paying their utility bills to keep their power on.

As we approach the hottest months of the year, energy usage will go up, and these same New Yorkers will likely fall even behind on their energy costs. Experts predict rising utility debt will affect residents' credit scores, result in service being disconnected, and even lead to homelessness which is already at crisis levels in New York City.

While the Governor and the State Legislature created a program to forgive the utility debt of many low-income New Yorkers, the funding is not nearly enough to meet the current need. I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting this important piece of legislation. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member Menin.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENIN: Thank you, Majority Leader Powers. When Roe v Wade was overturned, we faced the unconscionable reality that our daughters have less rights today than we did. And we literally have turned back the clock of time on women's rights by 100 years.

That is why I am proud to sponsor two Resolutions that the Council will vote on today that are part of the reproductive rights package. Resolution 200 would set January 22, 2023, as Roe v Wade Day in the City of New York to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the landmark Supreme Court decision. We will not forget such an important court case and that moment must be remembered.

In addition, Resolution 242 calls on the New York State Legislature to pass an equal rights amendment to the State Constitution. This would basically codify reproductive rights, uh, rights around sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, pregnancy, and other rights that are not currently enshrined in the State Constitution.

2 Lastly, I just want to thank the Speaker and my
3 colleagues for this legislative package today. It's a
4 really proud moment to be voting on all this. Thank
5 you.

6 MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Is anyone else

We'll now move into general discussion. Before that, we'll just do one quick correction on the vote. Land Use Item 85 and resolution 263 was adopted by a vote of 48 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative, and 0 abstentions. Thank you.

We'll now move into general discussion. We have 15 Members signed up. Reminder, it's a beautiful day in July, uh. It is, uh. We will begin with Council Member Holden, followed by Council Member Lee.

COUNCIL MEMBER HOLDEN: Thank you, Majority Leader. Uh, today I introduce, uh, Intro, uh, 573, which would prohibit the operation of horse-drawn cabs in Central Park, effectively banning horse-drawn carriages in New York City for good. Whether it was passing legislation creating the AC, uh, an ACC shelter in each Borough or to creating the heat index for horse-drawn carriages, to establishing an Office of Animal Welfare, increasing animal cruelty reporting, the banning of trafficking of wild birds, this Body has come together in the past to do great work on animal rights issues. Uh, and it's time, it's, it's time once again to step up for the

defenseless. It's time to advocate for the horses who have suffered for far too long.

We are here today to declare this City horse carriage free. And I need you, my colleagues, to help us achieve this. This is 2022. It's not 1822. We should not have horses serving humans for our greedy desires. We should not allow drivers to make a buck off the backs of these poor horses.

Other cities in Europe, Asia, the Middle East, and Mexico have already done this. New York City needs to be among them, and we need to be the leaders of this in the United States of America.

The drivers will be able to work more with electric carriages. They won't lose time due to the heat index or inclement weather as they do now. The jobs would be prevailing wage and without great benefits. Let's all work together to end the misery of these horses finally. Let's end horse carriages in New York City once and for all. Anyone who feels that horses have to serve man in the 21st century is out of touch.

I thank the advocates who have pushed for this. And I especially thank my colleagues who have signed on to this bill as, uh, Pre-Intro sponsors, uh.

Please sign on to Intro 570, 573, and help us again do the right thing by our animals. Thank you, Majority Leader. Almost made it.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member Lee followed by Council Member Won.

COUCNIL MEMBER LEE: Hi, everyone. Sorry, I just wanted to make a quick announcement. So, I'll send you guys all an email, but, um, just wanted you to be aware that this Saturday, uh, I'm sure you guys have heard about 988 which is the federal number to reach out about mental health versus 911. So, that is actually rolling out on Saturday, so I just wanted you guys to be aware of that. Um, and I'll send all of you information on it so that you can put it out on social media or let your constituents know about it.

Um, and I just had a meeting today with them about which languages. Uh, so far, right now, it's just English and Spanish. They're working with community partners for LGBTQ, Asian, and other, other organizations cause they want to find out which groups are on the ground doing the work in the mental

health side. So, reach out if you guys, um, have any groups you'd like to recommend.

And, um, there was one other thing which I forgot. Um, but that, but I just wanted you all to be aware of that cause it's important. There are going to be kinks, obviously, when it comes to the roll out, but they are going to be monitoring that closely.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to have Council Member Won followed by Council Member Brewer.

COUNCIL MEMBER WON: Thank you so much, Majority Leader Keith Powers. I just want to thank our Speaker, Adrienne Adams, as well as all of my Council colleagues on this historic day where we are passing legislation to protect reproductive rights and leading the way for all other cities to follow suit.

As a new mother who gave birth about fourth months ago, I cannot imagine if, during my second or third trimester of pregnancy, someone told me that I was forced to, that I had no option to opt out of fully delivering a child that did not want. And I believe that this is truly a healthcare issue, where this issue should solely be between the individual,

their partner, as well as their healthcare provider, and nobody else. So, I am incredibly grateful to be part of this legislative body to make sure that we're fighting for reproductive rights.

And I also want to point out that today, uh, with my Council colleagues Gutiérrez and Menin, we are introducing Intro 568, 598, and 599, where we will continue to legislate to make internet, affordable internet, accessible to all, so I encourage all of my colleagues to sign on. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We're going to hear from Council Member Brewer followed by Council Member Riley.

COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you very much. I have some sad news. Um, Joe Goldbloom died an hour ago. He was staff member for Archie Spigner, Leroy Comrie, Daneek Miller, and he certainly knew Council Member Williams and he was a real advocate for, um, Community, CD 27. He lived in Manhattan, commuted back and forth, and was a member of, uh, Community Board 11. So, it's a loss. He loved this City Council very much.

I am also supportive of, uh, Intro 563 which is being introduced today. Um, this is based, I think as

you know, on local law 46. 2013 when I passed the paid sick days, I remember DeBlasio took credit for it, but I was the one that actually passed it. And I also remember, um, that it took a lot of, uh, great work by Consumer Affairs. But just because we've had a long history of making sure that the, uh, powers that it provides particularly during COVID where people can get support for, uh, five days of paid sick days so they could take care of themselves or their family.

However, despite all the great efforts, there has been a recent study by A Better Balance and the Community Service Society whereby we learned that a significant percentage of working people in the City of New York, particularly women, did not know or have access to paid sick days. They just don't know about it.

So, that means that although the law passed nine years ago, there are many barriers of education and access to this law and workplaces in our City. And so, we need to make sure that not only can you file with Department of, of Consumer and Worker Protection, but we also want to have a right to file a private civil right of action. And that's what

these studies are calling for and that's what this bill calls for.

Thank you very much, and our prayers are with Joe Goldbloom's family.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member Riley, followed by Council Member Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER RILEY: Thank you, Majority Leader. And I just want to thank my colleagues for the well wishes to my family on our new addition. Um, I'm happy to partner with my colleague, Chair, uh, Rita Joseph to introduce legislations, Intro 588, which would require the DOE to disclose school admission and policies on its website for every school.

This bill would enhance the clarity of our infrastructure, giving further insight and transparency to where and how we can improve our education system. Providing online visibility including, but not limited to the application process, selection criteria, and priority groups, procedures for application, evaluation, and seat assignment criterias for every New York City school, encourages equity and accessible, accessibility to

inform essential to educational planning of our families.

Intro 588 will present the opportunity to codify and quantify these already common practices to a digital scale. Ensuring that we continue to upgrade our system is a conducive, it's conducive to supporting the needs of our families and uplifting scholars with the education they deserve. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. we'll now hear from Council Member Barron followed by Council Member Gutiérrez.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Uh, thank you Mister Chair. I just wanted to say to my colleagues, I stand now to give credit to those who voted against this budget. Those who said no to \$215 million cut from the Department of Education. Council Member Ossé, Council Member Feliz, Council Member Nurse, Council Member Richardson Jordan, and Council Member Barron and Council Member Cabán.

I feel a sense of vindication now that the City Council is considering, uh, putting that money back in a budget mod in November. We didn't even have to do that. You had the power to leave it in there in the first place. And I'm just hoping that we use the

power of this City Council during the budget process to prioritize the people and not pet projects because education is for liberation. And to deny these children what the administrators need to make education more qualitative in our communities. We're seeing it now all over. They're complaining. There's hurt. And it's not just the Department of Education. Most of the Departments, City Departments, are suffering because of this budget that was passed.

So, we may not be in favor with the Speaker or the Mayor, and we may not get as much as the rest of you, but we get a good night's sleep because we did the right thing in not voting for a budget that overfunded the police with \$11 billion and underfunded education with \$215 million. I hope you can do the right thing this time and restore it in November.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Council Member Gutiérrez followed by Council Member Schulman.

COUNCIL MEMBER GUTIÉRREZ: Thank you, Majority. Uh, thank you. Um, uh, I'm proud to work alongside Council Member Won to introduce a package of bills today that look towards building equity when it comes

to what should be considered a public utility, the internet.

I am tired of people calling the internet a luxury. It is a necessity of everyday life. The digital divide is a structured reality that perpetuates social, economic, and political disparities. It is essentially digital redlining, excluding the working poor from an essential infrastructure that allows people to function in today's society.

My bill, Intro 568, requires the Office of Technology Innovation to report on the utilization of the City's discounted internet service programs, and to significantly improve their outreach to eligible households. The bills introduced by Council Member, uh, Won, also work toward the goal of ensuring that more New Yorkers know about this program and have the assistance to obtain it. I encourage all of you to sign on. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll go to Council Member Schulman followed by Council Member Hanif.

COUNCIL MEMBER SCHULMAN: Thank you. I have devoted by personal and professional life to

healthcare advocacy which was born out the HIV/AIDS movement, where I witnessed friends and neighbors die because of the indifference of those in power. I sadly had the same feeling of indifference with the sloppy roll out of the Monkeypox vaccine both on the federal and local level.

I have been in constant contact with the DOHMH, the Mayor's Office, advocates, epidemiologists, and others on this issue. I want to thank my colleagues in the LGBTQIA+ Caucus for their support and collaboration and want to thank the Speaker for her leadership and support in planned actions we will be taking in the near future. Please stay tuned.

With regards to the rising COVID rates, I am working with Council staff and colleagues to ensure the Department of Health provides all New Yorkers with the transparent tools and data needed for all of us to make informed decisions on what we need to do as New Yorkers to protect ourselves and stay healthy. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll hear now from Council Member Hanif followed by Council Member Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER HANIF: Thank you. Today I'm introducing two bills focused on empowering our immigrant communities. Intro 569 would create an immigrant workers bill of rights. While many federal, state, and local labor protections apply to workers of all immigrant statuses, man, most immigrants are not aware of this fact, which leaves them vulnerable to various forms of exploitation. This bill of rights would compile all of these protections into a succinct document that employers would be required to distribute to all of their workers annually. The bill of rights would also be required to be conspicuously displayed in physical workplaces and also included in digital workplaces, such as the worker facing side of apps.

Equipping immigrant and workers with knowledge of their rights will allow them to exercise them when violations occur. Additionally, we hope that this will dissuade employers from committing the violations in the first place. And I want to thank Council Member Avilés for introducing this bill alongside me.

Intro 570 would create an Office of Translation and Interpretation within the Mayor's Office of

Immigrant Affairs. Currently, our City Agencies outsource most of their language services to out of state companies who produce subpar work at high costs. For budget reasons, some Agencies have failed to comply with local law 30 which requires documents be translated in the City's 10 most spoken languages resulting in essential materials, such as fact sheets about the COVID-19 vaccine, failing to reach immigrant communities. By bringing this work in house, we can ensure compliance with local law 30, improve the quality and cost-effectiveness of services, and provide high quality City jobs for New Yorkers with language skills.

I want to thank Council Members De La Rosa, Marte, Brennan, Narcisse, Brewer, Ung, and Gutiérrez for introducing this bill alongside me. And you will hear more from me over email. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We will not hear from Council Member Rivera, followed by Council Member Cabán.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you so much. Today I'm proud to introduce several pieces of legislation, including a permanent open culture program with Council Member Ossé, which will bring arts and

culture to our streets and public spaces, making our vital cultural institutions more accessible to all New Yorkers. Um, also legislation to ensure proper language access at polling site with Council member Avilés, protecting and enhancing the most sacred of our rights, our right to vote, reporting on the medical care and outcomes of incarcerated people, and finally a Resolution recognizing animals as sentient beings entitled to respect, consideration, and protection from abuse.

In recent years, the Council has done amazing work on animal rights. And this Resolution memorializes for our City, what we've all come to know, that animals are worthy of dignity and humane treatment. It also calls on the state to pass legislation as in Oregon which recognizes the state's responsibility to animal welfare. I always say, uh, how we treat animals is a reflection of our society. And I hope my colleagues will support this resolution.

The work that we do here in the Council affects not just the eight million New Yorkers in the City, but everyone in the country. And I am so proud of the package of bills we're passing today and of course,

the legislation that I have introduced, um, and that my colleagues have introduced. And so, we can continue to be a model for the rest of the nation. I want to, and I, I just want to say thank you to everyone, body, congratulations on this historic and landmark legislation we've passed today. And I hope you will join me in signing on to my bills. thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now hear from Council Member Cabán, followed by Council Member Marte, followed by Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABÁN: Thank you. I am proud to be introducing two Resolutions today, Resolution 257, declaring solidarity with workers organizing unions across the City, and Resolution 256, calling upon Washington to pass and enact the COVID-19 Long Haulers Act.

You know, as the price of, of food, fuel, medicine, energy, rent, and other essential purchases continue to soar, the billionaire class is extracting profits hand over fist with their wealth going up by almost \$2 trillion during the pandemic. Workers are standing up and saying they won't take it anymore and the number of filings for union elections are up 56%

1 this fiscal year, compared to 2021. And the same
2 bosses reaping the most exorbitant windfall profits
3 are employing the dirtiest, most gutter scraping,
4 union busting tactics. And it won't work because we
5 stand with the workers, and, uh, you know, clearly
6 and without apology. And so, you know, this is about
7 saying that New York is a union town.
8

9 For the Long COVID Resolution, 20% to 30% of all
10 people infected with COVID will develop lasting
11 symptoms, some which may be temporary, but others
12 which may be chronic, some which may be mild, others
13 which may be debilitating. So, to understand the
14 enormity of this problem, consider that cases are
15 currently skyrocketing with the most infectious
16 variant yet which provides little to no immunity
17 against reinfection, even for those who are fully
18 vaccinated, and we continue to destroy every last
19 shred of public health protections we ever had. This
20 will go down in history as a mass disabling event,
21 and our healthcare system is not currently capable of
22 absorbing the crush. So, we need Washington to act,
23 to act now, and to act boldly. Thanks.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Council Member Marte, followed by Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARTE: Thank you. Storefront vacancies are abundant in Chinatown, Lorry side, because of the devastating economic impact of the pandemic, had on low-income communities. Our neighborhoods need investment in order to recover. But instead, tech company vultures have swooped in to peak at, pick at our wounds. So today, I'm honored to introduce with Council Member Menin a package of legislation to regulate 15-minute delivery apps and their micro fulfillment center, commonly known as dark stores.

My two bills, Intro 579 and Intro 580, will help protect delivery workers that are exploited by these companies. By setting weight limit, weight limits on orders, we are protecting workers' bodies and health and increasing their chances of survival in case of a traffic incident. But to, but to stop traffic accidents, we have to stop the inhumane 15-minute delivery promise.

Our second bill will require disclosure of delivery time estimates to take pressure off of

workers to meet this intense time burden demand. Our bodegas, small businesses, and delivery workers have suffered a lot from the pandemic, while companies like Gopuff and Gorillas have used our crisis to launch their platforms.

Micro fulfillment center and 15-minute delivery apps are trying to flip our immigrant neighborhoods into storage yards for Silicon Valley. This legislative package is essential crackdown on this tech-backed exploitation of our city's storefront vacancy crisis, our delivery workers, and our immigrant-owned bodegas and 99 cent stores.

Thank you, Asian American Federation, and [SPEAKING IN FOREIGN LANGUAGE] for their advocacy on this issue. And thank you to Council Member Menin for partnering on this important legislation with me.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. We'll now go to Council member Brooks-Powers and last, we'll go to Council Member Restler to finish us off.

COUNCIL MEMBER BROOKS-POWERS: Thank you. I'll try this again. Um, but I just want to speak briefly on the bill I'm introducing with my colleague, Council Woman Rita Joseph, which will ban the sale of flavored cigarettes. We are all aware of the serious

health impacts that smoking can cause, and these effects are born disproportionately by communities of color and especially younger adults who have long been targeted by advertising campaigns and ease of access. This bill will improve health outcomes and reduce the risks of smoking among vulnerable New Yorkers. I encourage my colleagues to sign on as co-sponsors.

I'd also be remiss if I did not thank Council Member Williams for, um, submitting Mrs. Renee Bluford to be added to the already, um, implemented street co-name for David Bluford. Um, the two married couples were a staple in the southeast Queens community, um, and we treasured and valued them dearly, and they are certainly missed. And so, um, it is definitely appropriate for the honor to now have the Renee and David Bluford, um, street co-naming.

And I also extend my condolences to the family of Joe Goldbloom as well, who was a staple in southeast Queens community. He didn't live there, but we should have probably a street in southeast Queens resurrected for him, because he has definitely been someone who has, um, dedicated his life and service,

but especially to the southeast Queens community.

Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. And last,
we'll go to Council Member Restler.

COUNCIL MEMBER RESTLER: Thank you so much,
Majority Leader. I'll just say very briefly, uh, that
it's an honor to be a part of, uh, this institution
today with this historic and landmark package. And I
especially want to congratulate each of the prime
sponsors on putting together such a compelling
package of bills to protect, uh, reproductive rights
for people across this country, um, here in New York
City.

Uh, secondly, I, I just wanted to echo the
sentiments of Council Member Barron, uh, that we have
work to do to restore the education cuts. And I
wanted to thank the Speaker for her leadership on the
letter this week and really hope that we can continue
to put the utmost pressure on the Mayor to restore
these cuts. Uh, today I designated more than \$200,000
in Member-based initiatives to support elementary
schools in District 33 to try to help, um, fill gaps.
But we have much, much more work to do there.

And then lastly, I just wanted to, uh, express my gratitude to a member of my team who we were able to convince to join us on an interim basis, uh, Jesse Tassen (SP?). He was the Chief of Staff to another Member of the Council for the last eight years and he agreed to help transition us into the, into the Body and, and show us the ropes, and myself, my Chief of Staff, Marianne Alexander and our whole team are greatly appreciative of Jesse's services. He's going on to a great job at, at Goddard Riverside. So, he'll be working with you, Gail, to, if she's not here anymore, but he'll be working with the good folks on the Upper West Side. But he's been a tremendous asset to me, and, and to our whole District, and our staff. And I really want to thank him for, you know, helping to, to just get our, our, um, to help show us the ropes. So, thank you Jesse, and best of luck to you in the future.

MAJORITY LEADER POWERS: Thank you. Is there anyone else who'd like to speak? Okay. Seeing none, uh, we'll now call on Speaker Adrienne Adams to close today's Stated Meeting.

SPEAKER ADAMS: Uh, before we close the meeting, I definitely, too, want to acknowledge and uplift, um,

as former Council Member I. Daneek Miller used to call him, the Great Joe Goldbloom. Uh, Joe was an amazing man. He wanted the best for New York and all New Yorkers and especially he loved southeast Queens and loved so many of us that he took under his wings for so many years. Joe is already missed, but he will be sorely missed as we continue on our walk on this journey. I've just been given word that, uh, his services will be this Monday, the 18th, at 11:00 a.m. We'll send the information to our Council membership.
